Member Biographies

Dr Peter Boone is a former academic economist and financier and now director of Effective Intervention.

Prof Willem Buiter is a former member of the Monetary Policy Committee and now a Professor at the LSE. He is on secondment for 2 years as Chief Economist at Citigroup. He writes a world-famous blog, and is one of Britain's best-known economists.

Prof Charles Goodhart is Britain's leading academic expert on banking and an LSE Professor. He is a former member of the Bank of England Monetary Policy Committee and an adviser to Standard Chartered Bank.

Andrew Haldane is Executive Director for Financial Stability, Bank of England. He is an editor of the Bank's Financial Stability Report and is the leading writer in the Bank on microeconomic issues to do with finance.

Will Hutton writes in the Observer and is the only leading economic commentator to have consistently criticised the claims of the finance industry. He is author of 3 best-selling books, including *The State We're In*.

Prof John Kay is an extremely well-known writer of books and articles including *The Long and the Short of It* on the shortcomings of the financial system. He writes a weekly column in the FT.

Sir Andrew Large is former Deputy Governor of the Bank of England.

Prof Lord Richard Layard is Chair of the Group and until 2003 was Founder-Director of the Centre for Economic Performance. He is Emeritus Professor of Economics at the London School of Economics.

Andrew Smithers is founding Chairman of Smithers & Co

Lord Adair Turner, is Chairman of the Financial Services Authority and Chair of the Working Group of the G20's Financial Stability Board. He is author of *Just Capital - The Liberal Economy* (2001) and numerous articles and lectures.

Dr Sushil Wadhvani, originally an academic economist, is a former Member of the Monetary Policy Committee of the Bank of England and is now founder/CEO of Wadhvani Asset Management. He is a much respected City intellectual.
